About Us

Lakeside Outreach is located in the town Slave Lake in northern Alberta, in the Municipal District of Lesser Slave River. It is located 257 km north of Edmonton on the southeast shore of Lesser Slave Lake at the junction of Highway 2 and Highway 88.

The school offers an alternative learning environment with programming which is individualized, flexible and offered within a small, personal setting. The school, which has a student population base of approximately 60 from grade 7 to grade 12, is located in the heart of Slave Lake with a team of dedicated staff providing quality education to the diverse student population.

Principal's Message

There is a great team at Lakeside Outreach School, including career coaches, learning support teacher and wellness support. It is of utmost importance to us that all students feel welcomed, cared for, respected and safe when they are at our school, and that students have access to quality learning that most effectively meets their socio-emotional and scheduling needs. Lakeside offers an alternative learning environment with individualized, flexible programming within a small, personal setting for those students whose needs (educational, psychological, social, or employability) may not be met through a traditional school setting. We also take pride in relationships and partnerships we have established in our local area, with the parents and guardians of our students. We encourage open and on-going communication between home and school.

Comments on Results

The transient nature of the student population at Outreach schools and blending of students with the local high school influences this data. In addition, COVID-19 created a difficult learning environment for many students during the 2020-2021 school year. Goal setting initiatives such as having students complete forms with their teachers outlining 'next steps' for their courses were utilized to encourage student achievement. Lakeside Outreach School also operated without the support of an Indigenous Education Coach to assist with cultural infusion, but teachers continued to encourage opportunities for students to share their culture and beliefs through alternative assignments and virtual opportunities.

Comments on Results

- Though we had a significant increase of over 10% on overall satisfaction regarding student citizenship, there were only 6 respondents in 2021. Moving forward we would like to promote participation in the government survey and increase the number of stakeholders we are able to gather this data from. Implementation of our own surveys to supplement this data will also be considered.
- An initiative promoting the characteristics of active citizenship, taken at Lakeside Outreach School during the 2020-2021 school year, included the teachers actively seeking out opportunities for community involvement in the facilitation of authentic learning experiences, whether it was bringing in guest speakers or connecting students to community venues. This was somewhat restricted due to COVID-19 procedures that were put in place across Alberta schools, when compared to previous years. However, social media was also utilized to promote healthy living, celebration of student character and school wellness opportunities for students. Furthermore, CTS credits linked to personal development and active citizenship are offered.

Comments on Results

While student satisfaction with learning engagement was higher than the province and authority at Lakeside Outreach in 2020-2021, only six respondents contributed to this data and there is no parent or teacher data to compare it to. Also, because only 2 teachers are connected to Lakeside Outreach School, that data is always suppressed. Despite this limited data, the school continues to offer an alternative learning environment with individualized, flexible programming within a small, personal setting for those students whose needs (educational, psychological, social, or employability) may not be met through a traditional school setting. This can have a significant impact on levels of engagement for some students, where universal accommodations and wellness support is infused into the day to day operations of the classroom.

Comments on Results

The transient nature of the student population at Lakeside Outreach School and blending between Outreach and the local high school influences the data and causes it to fluctuate throughout the various school years. COVID-19 also created a difficult learning environment for many students. However, Lakeside Outreach School teachers continue to offer flexible scheduling alongside academic, career and wellness support that regularly communicates with students and their families. Enrollment meetings have also been put in place in which every new student and their family meets with the school administrator to discuss a school success plan, academic needs, career goals and school expectations.

Comments on Results

Parent data is suppressed due to limited responses received, while only six students responded to the survey. It should also be noted that only a limited number of students attended Lakeside Outreach School in-person regularly during the 2020-2021 school year, when these surveys were released. Aside from the limited data provided, overall student satisfaction with the opportunity to receive a broad program of study has increased in the school due to the establishment of an effective and engaging Foods program and community-based Phys. Ed. program.

Comments on Results

The focus of many full-time Outreach students is completing high school and getting into the workforce, versus achieving credentials for post-secondary admission. Many Outreach students are also blended with the local high school where they will graduate and may be taking many of their core courses, which affects this data. A career coach is in place to help the small number of full time, post-secondary bound graduates that do move through Lakeside Outreach School ensure they have the necessary credentials and to help students with the application process. Teachers also continue to provide opportunities for students to use feedback, learn from mistakes and upgrade assignments.

here was a significant increase in student satisfaction with the learning environment noted, but this is based on limited responses alongside
suppressed data for parents and teachers. However, Lakeside Outreach School continues to provide wrap-around support to students (Career
Coach, Wellness Coach, Counselling Consultant, Teachers and Learning Support), while maintaining a small intimate environment that one
student described this year as having a "family feel" to it. The PowerFULL Kids nutrition grant Lakeside Outreach School receives, provided by
President's Choice, also funds a robust nutrition program at Lakeside Outreach School that allows students to access free healthy snacks and hot
lunches daily.

Comments on Results

An increase in student satisfaction with school improvement is noted here, based on limited responses, but could be linked to two big factors: Lakeside Outreach School did not have to close its doors due to COVID-19 last year and it also moved into a newly renovated building where they no longer shared their space with another institution. Initiatives to expand the in-school library were also taken.

Comments on Results

During the 2020-2021 school year, the only full-time student who graduated from Lakeside Outreach School was on a modified program and received a Certificate of School Completion. However, a career coach is in place that helps encourage an academic focus and post-secondary transition for students who do attend Lakeside Outreach School by booking presentations from post-secondary institutions, sharing resources, working with both students and teachers to monitor course progress, and connecting students to apprenticeship and post-secondary opportunities that are within their reach and area of interest.

Comments on Results

The number of students writing the OCA in recent years at Lakeside Outreach School has declined due to smaller enrollment numbers in grade 10 and the fact that junior high students are not currently associated with the school. The OCA process sees teachers assess the OCA in multidisciplinary marking groups, with a minimum of two teachers marking the assessment and a third if there are any inconsistencies. The assessment is used to collect some data on reading comprehension ability amongst Lakeside Outreach School students, which is further supported by one of the teachers who sits on the divisional literacy committee where best practices and the significance and use of collected data is often discussed..

Comments on Results

Based on the responses of only six students, there has been a decline in satisfaction with the overall quality of basic education. Students at
Lakeside Outreach School are expected to be more independent as learners and will get out of their modules and schoolwork quality learning that
coincides with their own effort and engagement. However, in the past student coursework was ADLC module based only, which has its limitations
as far as engagement in education. As the school moves away from the ADLC materials in light of their closure, there is considerable effort being
put into developing engaging course materials and incorporating technological platforms HPSD students are accustomed to, such as Google.
Varied assessment and triangulation of evidence are also important topics of discussion for Lakeside Outreach School staff as they move forward
with school professional development.

Comments on Results

• Parent and teacher data is suppressed due to limited responses and this is no comparable past data to comment on. However, the school continues to provide wrap-around support services to students (Career Coach, Wellness Coach, Counselling Consultant, Teachers, Learning Support) within a small intimate environment. Monthly student celebrations were held during the 2020-2021 school year to recognize student achievement, leadership and citizenship, which was also promoted on social media. Flexible programming and scheduling is developed on a case-by-case basis to meet the socio-emotional and learning needs of Lakeside Outreach School students, with a wellness coach who often provides emotional support to students integrating into the school. Mistakes are celebrated as learning opportunities at Lakeside Outreach School and teachers offer students the ability to use feedback to upgrade assignments and demonstrate competency with learning outcomes in a variety of ways.

Student support and services are in some ways more easily and informally accessible to students within the smaller, intimate environment that Lakeside Outreach School offers. Career and wellness coaches, during their time in the building, are easily integrated into classroom discussions and activities when needed or beneficial to student success. Community-based partnerships and the presence of a Joint-Use Agreement with the town allows students to access several services and venues in the Slave Lake community through the school and with the support of the school staff.

Comments on Results

Flexible programming and scheduling for students at Lakeside Outreach School allows teachers to be creative in establishing ways for students to achieve early success, build their credits and access timetables that will work for them and their family. Use of quiet spaces, extra time and the wellness coaches, among other universal accommodations, are supports provided to students as well. The Lakeside Outreach School staff also collaborates with a divisional learning support teacher to strengthen inclusive practices at the school in the name of success for all learners.

Inclusion - Pyramid of Intervention

HPSD supports inclusion through a multi-tiered approach. All students have a continuum of needs that can be met, to a varying degree, by differentiated instruction. School-based Learning Support Teachers (LSTs) engage in coaching conversations with staff regarding the ways and means of supporting a differentiated program of studies.

Each HPSD school annually reviews their pyramid of intervention to include:

- the universal, targeted and intensive supports available
- the process by which teachers collaborate to implement strategies [Response to Intervention]
- a display of the pyramid of intervention in a designated area where staff have easy access
- development of a network of supports to enable conversations about the progress of students

A divisional Educational Assistant committee was founded with representatives from each school. The representatives surveyed their school's educational assistants to determine areas of interest to support students and professional development opportunities to reflect local context.

First Nation, Métis, and Inuit Programming (Indigenous Education Coaches)

The Indigenous Education Coach has shifted its focus from a student-centered approach to a Universal Education Model.

The goals of this model is that all students will have a deep understanding of our Canadian history, including Indigenous cultures, perspectives, Treaties and Land agreements, the Legacy of Residential Schools, and the contributions of Indigenous Culture in shaping our Canadian identity.

This model will support all staff in meeting the TQS #5 through monthly professional development sessions designed to build the capacity of our teachers to accurately and confidently deliver Indigenous materials in their classrooms. Moving future generations forward in creating a more inclusive Canada.

This model will allow Indigenous Learners to see themselves reflected in the curriculum. Classroom content across subject areas from Kindergarten to grade 12 will be respectful, authentic and genuine. Often including consultations with Elders and Knowledge Keepers.

The Indigenous Education Team has supported all the schools within the division. Some of the events and activities that took place in the 2020-21 school year included:

All schools received one hour of coach-led professional development each month.

Although we were unable to have Elders, Knowledge Keepers, and presenters come into our schools, we took advantage of technology by having division-wide virtual presentations. Some of these presentations included:

- Métis politician Inier Gauchier joined the Grade 9 classroom to discuss governance and rights.
- Storytellers and Indigenous educators joined High School Science classes to discuss the concepts of interconnection and Indigenous worldviews.
- Indigenous musician Brianne Lizotte taught the origins of the Métis fiddle and jigging.
- Indigenous author Jessica Johns gave a presentation to High School English students in their poetry units.
- All Indigenous graduates took part in virtual Sacred Feather teachings and Sash teachings.

High School students participated in the virtual Indspire Youth Conference.

High School students met virtually with Indigenous professors and scholars from the University of Calgary as a kick-off to an Indigenous Mentorship Program with the goal of encouraging students to pursue a career in education.

Land-based learning still took place with local Elders in outdoor spaces that were within walking distance from our schools. Teachings included trapping and hunting, tipi teachings, traditional medicine walks, traditional food gathering and storage, ice fishing, and fish drying and smoking.

Ongoing classroom presentations in all subject areas from Kindergarten to Grade 12 included treaty presentations, Kairos Blanket Exercises, 7 Grandfather Teachings, and medicine wheel teachings.

The Indigenous Education Team started the development of a Google Classroom, which is in place for the 2021-22 school year. It is filled with resources to support Kindergarten to Grade 12 classrooms in all subject areas.

Comments on Results

Though a significant increase is noted in student satisfaction with program access, this was based on the responses of a far smaller student sample than in previous years.
