MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

It is an exciting year at Lakeside Outreach School, as the current administration team is now in our fourth year together, managing the school. We continue to push the boundaries of education, create authentic learning opportunities for students, collaborate with local organizations to strengthen students' educational experience and connect students to arts, culture, job readiness and post-secondary opportunities. Our school also continues to score higher on the 'Alberta Education Assurance (AEA)' survey than the school division or province when it comes to measures of citizenship, the establishment of a welcome, caring, respectful and safe learning environment, and accessing supports and services.

In the past three years, we have worked to raise academic expectations, and establish new systems and processes for enrolment and programming at Lakeside Outreach School, improving the school's three year high school completion rate from 0% to 52.9% and achieving an overall measure evaluation of 'acceptable' on the 2024 'Alberta Education Assurance Measure Results' for the first time. Four year high school completion rates have also seen gains during this time, as well as diploma examination participation rates and student performance on these examinations. We look forward to continue building on this momentum, by targeting student learning engagement and education quality through course development initiatives and educational partnerships. Our vice principal is currently seeking to increase credit opportunities for students by collaborating with the Indigenous education coach on the development of a 'Braided Journeys' program for students at Lakeside Outreach School and Roland Michener Secondary School, while our teachers have made it a professional development goal this year to develop a 'real-world' themed Math 10-3 course that spirals the curriculum, as prescribed by current neuroscience. Furthermore, we are working with Roland Michener Secondary School to establish more effective 'Knowledge and Employability (K&E)' options, and have onboarded Lakeside Outreach School's first educational assistant this year to support our growing number of at-risk students and the diverse learning needs we serve, both inperson and virtually.

We look forward to communicating and collaborating with all of our families this year, in support of student success!

COMMENTS

Teachers at Lakeside Outreach School are continuously developing relevant and timely course materials to replace Alberta Distance Learning Centre resources outreach schools typically relied on before their closure. The aim is for these newly developed learning materials to be engaging and meaningful to students in both synchronous and asynchronous situations, connecting them to a variety of resources and support to ensure success whatever their circumstances. It is also suspected that providing student-choice through this work, in how to demonstrate competency with learning outcomes, and when they will address specific assignments throughout the year has helped this measure see a 6.1% increase since last year.

Lakeside Outreach School has maintained an overall measure of excellent amongst students who are satisfied they model characteristics of active citizenship. Teachers seek to foster a sense of community and supportiveness within our small and unique learning environment, where we celebrate peer support and mentoring, community involvement and lifelong learning. Every month our staff nominates students to be awarded 'Citizen of the Month' during our monthly class celebration day, alongside 'Monthly Masterchef' and 'Athlete of the Month,' which are awarded to students that excel in Foods and Physical Education while displaying leadership, teamwork and a growth mindset. Students at our school are also encouraged to pursue credits through community volunteerism initiatives.

COMMENTS

In the last three years, Lakeside Outreach School has established strategic, collaborative and intentional systems and processes for communication, enrolment, tracking progress and providing at-risk students with appropriate wrap-around supports when needed. In addition we have applied a healthy amount of pressure to our independent learning environment by establishing a two semester course calendar and ten school day minimum submission requirement for core courses. The result has led to our school being awarded an overall measure evaluation of 'acceptable' on our three year high school completion rate in 2023 for the first time. This measure has improved significantly from 0% in 2021 to 52.9% in 2023. Four year high school completion rates have also seen gains during this time period. We hope to continue to strengthen these numbers through collaboration with career coaches in establishing and updating students' academic plans throughout their school career, continued identification of key issues for students through Collaborative Response and School Support Team Meetings that all staff members are expected to contribute expertise to, maintaining an up-to-date student information system, and enacting our school attendance and submission policy.

COMMENTS

A number of initiatives have been implemented at Lakeside Outreach School to ensure student success on Diploma Exams. Prior to January and June exams, the classroom and learning support teachers collaborate on Diploma Exam preparation workshops, which all diploma-level students are invited to. Throughout the year, regular written and verbal feedback is provided to students enrolled in diploma-level courses by their teachers, along with opportunities to use this constructive feedback to upgrade assignments. Triangulation of learning evidence gathered from observations, conversations and submitted products helps ensure final grades for diploma-level courses are accurate. Furthermore diploma-level students are expected to submit summative assessments within every ten school days, and demonstrate successful completion of half their course(s) by Alberta Education's established deadline to register students for each semester's Diploma Exams. Lastly, the English Language Arts 30-2 course was fully redesigned in 2023 to be delivered more effectively through High Prairie School Division's Google platforms. Student choice in texts to study was also increased through this redesign, in order to engage a wider variety of student interests and perspectives. We are happy to see this work has led to an increase in students writing this Diploma Exam at our school, alongside a 2024 measure of 100% in relation to students who scored the acceptable standard on it. This is the first time the school has achieved an overall measurement of 'excellent,' with regards to the acceptable standard on the English Language Arts 30-2 Diploma Exam, while we also saw students meet the standard of excellence for the first time in 2024 and at a higher rate than the school authority or province saw. The Social Studies 30-2 results also exceeded our 2024 targets, while Biology 30 remains an area of concern and main focus for 2025.

COMMENTS

Though an increase of eight students from 2023 to 2024 expressing their opinion on the overall quality of basic education at our school coincided with a 3.5% decrease in those who expressed satisfaction, Lakeside Outreach School continues to outperform our school authority on this measure, and achieved only 1.1% lower than the provincial measurement in 2024. High expectations, along with varied and authentic assessment practices continue to be maintained at our school, in relation to students demonstrating competency with curricular outcomes. Currently, the school is supported by 1.5 teachers, despite increasing demand for our academic programming. Managing workload through course caps and alternating courses being offered each semester helps to guide teacher focus and improve the quality of courses being offered. We have also managed to develop an effective academic schedule for our school that provides students the ability to complete all high school diploma requirements fully through our programming, if needed. 10, 20 and 30-level courses are offered both semesters, catering to potential students in all high school grades throughout the year as well. Furthermore, 2024-2025 professional development initiatives at Lakeside Outreach School have teachers considering ways to strengthen course assessments, incorporate neuroscience research around making learning stick into their lesson plans, and develop more relevant and appealing course materials for students.

ASSURANCE DOMAIN: TEACHING AND LEADING - LOCAL COMPONENT

PROFESSIONAL LEARNING, SUPERVISION AND EVALUATION

Professional Growth Plans

Teachers and administrators share and review their professional growth plans with the school principal during a meeting in the Fall. They discuss with the principal at this meeting the effectiveness of their listed strategies, how they will measure their goals, the reality of their timelines, when or how follow-up will be carried out throughout the school year, and what support administration might be able to provide. This first semester meeting and follow-up process heightens accountability and helps instill a greater importance on the value of having a meaningful professional growth plan.

Ongoing Supervision and Growth

A vice principal works on site, in a dual role as a teacher. This administrator is responsible for day-to-day supervision of the teacher and follow-up. Our teacher and vice principal collaborate closely on capacity building projects throughout the school year, fueling each other's growth as teachers. Lakeside Outreach School's professional development plan this year involves exploring new ways to deliver Math curricula and strengthen numeracy results.

Collaborative Response

All staff members engage in a structured School Support Team Meeting (SSTM) each month, to identify key issues in our learning community and share strategies based on a variety of perspectives and expertise. While action items are created at these meetings, the value in the SSTM is that the structure builds staff capacity by drawing on the expertise within our own learning community.

Evaluation

The school principal is responsible for teachers under evaluation at Lakeside Outreach School, while the on-site vice principal has been tasked with the evaluating of support staff, in collaboration with the principal.

COMMENTS

Lakeside Outreach School continues to perform much higher than the school authority and province in this area, based on the twenty-eight student respondents in 2024. In addition to ongoing teacher support, students were able to access a wellness coach for one-on-one counselling, and a career coach to discuss career pathways and post-secondary options as needed during the 2023-2024 school year. A learning support teacher also collaborated with teachers to ensure Individual Student Plans (ISPs) were in place and inclusion needs were considered throughout the year, alongside a provisional psychologist who was able to advise the team, meet with students and families, and enact cognitive assessments as needed. Lakeside Outreach School continues to refine our use of Jigsaw Learning's Collaborative Response model as a way to ensure all students receive the support they need, and to build capacity of the school staff in addressing key issues.

COMMENTS

Lakeside Outreach School continues to provide wrap-around support to students, including academic, career and wellness support, within a small intimate environment. Monthly student celebrations were held during the 2023-2024 school year to recognize student achievement, leadership and citizenship, which was also promoted on social media. Flexible programming and scheduling is developed on a case-by-case basis at our school to meet the socio-emotional and learning needs of Lakeside Outreach School students. Throughout the school year we also continue to bring in CTS opportunities that address workplace safety, bullying, supporting positive behaviour and healthy relationships when possible. These opportunities are also supplemented by presentations from local organizations concerned with these subjects, alongside learning experiences connected to addictions, healthy living, reconciliation and gender-based violence. This work has led to an increase of 1.2% in the past year, with regards to students who agree that our learning environment is welcoming, caring, respectful and safe.

ASSURANCE DOMAIN: LEARNING SUPPORTS - LOCAL COMPONENT

ACCESS TO A CONTINUUM OF SUPPORTS AND SERVICES

HPSD supports inclusion through a multi-tiered approach. All students have a continuum of needs that can be met, to a varying degree, by differentiated instruction. School-based Learning Support Teachers (LSTs) engage in coaching conversations with staff regarding the ways and means of supporting a differentiated program of studies.

Each HPSD school annually reviews their response to intervention, inclusive of:

- the universal, targeted, and intensive supports available,
- the process by which teachers collaborate to implement strategies,
- support networks for updates about student progression,
- display their continuum of supports in a designated area where staff have easy access.

FIRST NATION, MÉTIS, AND INUIT PROGRAMMING (INDIGENOUS EDUCATION COACHES)

The Indigenous Education Coaching team employs a universal education model. The goal of this model is for all students to have a deep understanding of our Canadian history, including Indigenous cultures, perspectives, Treaties and Land agreements, the Legacy of Residential Schools, and the contributions of Indigenous Culture in shaping our Canadian identity.

This model supports all staff in meeting the Teaching Quality Standard (TQS) #5 through professional development sessions designed to build the capacity of our teachers to accurately and confidently deliver Indigenous materials in their classrooms. They are moving future generations forward in creating a more inclusive Canada. A continued and focused area for the Indigenous Education Team is to promote and advance calls to action in Truth and Reconciliation.

This model allows Indigenous learners to see themselves reflected in the curriculum. Classroom content across subject areas from Kindergarten to Grade 12 will be respectful, authentic, and genuine and will include consultations with Elders and Knowledge Keepers within our local context.

COMMENTS

This data can be very much affected by the transient nature of a portion of our student population and the fact that, for many of them, our school has not been their only high school experience prior to enrolling. However, we do recognize and prioritize the need for continued growth on this measure at Lakeside Outreach School, which will likely be either an indicator or influencer of positive gains on other measures, such as Rutherford eligibility and graduation rates. A positive in the data is the significant increase in the percentages of students writing across the board, with a decrease in the number of third year high school students not writing any diploma exams. Our school offers Biology 30, Science 30, English Language Arts 30-2 and Social Studies 30-2 as diploma-level course options currently.

COMMENTS

Lakeside Outreach School is now seeing more full-time students than ever enrolling. Alongside this shift in student population, our data is showing major improvement to our drop out rates, which was reduced by nearly 16% between 2022 to 2023. Building on these gains, we are now ensuring the career coach is more fully involved in the enrolment process, and engaging students in community and leadership opportunities. Lakeside Outreach School students have access to team sports at Roland Michener Secondary School through our partnership with that school, a credit-based Youth Council for Reconciliation program currently being developed in collaboration with our Indigenous education coach, in-person cooking labs and daily physical education activities, in addition to their core coursework. These are some of the fun and meaninful ways to get involved at our school. Teachers continually review and explore Career and Technology Studies (CTS) options we can engage students with as well, and promote them as events to enhance participation, including posters, sign-up sheets and recruitment campaigns. Our 'Junior PD Days,' connecting students to local experts and career-related learning experiences and field trips, as well as our 'CALM Blitz' program, are examples of this.

COMMENTS

Lakeside Outreach School achieved a 73.5% student satisfaction rate in 2024, with regards to receiving a broad program of studies, including fine arts, career, technology, and health and physical education. Our school maintained the previous year's acceptable performance on this overall measure, within 0.1%, which is comparable to the provincial trend also recorded here. Currently we offer students credit opportunities in all of the listed areas of study. Some of these learning opportunities come in the form of fieldtrips, workshops, off-campus programming such as Work Experience or the Registered Apprenticeship Program (RAP), online dual-credit courses, daily in-person lessons or via self-directed courses that students work through at their own pace. The fine arts are promoted in our school via cross-curricular course assignments involving visual communication and design and through the delivery of a successful and engaging Art 10 course, worth five credits to students. Our partnership with Roland Michener Secondary School also gives our students access to programming we are not able to offer such as Shop, Drama, Art 20 & 30, Cosmetology and Knowledge & Employability (K&E) courses. In addition, though our school is limited in what we can offer, due to our teaching complement, we have been utilizing our partnership with Golden Hills School Division to connect students to core humanities courses once ours are full, and if Roland Michener Secondary School is not an option.

COMMENTS

Student satisfaction with programs for at-risk students being easy to access and timely continues to be over 20% stronger at our school versus the school authority or province. The small, intimate environment of our in-person outreach school allows for deeper connections to be made between school staff and students, and a more responsive environment established. The flexible nature of Lakeside Outreach School in meeting the needs of a diverse population of students, facing various life circumstances that make success difficult in the traditional school setting, also allows the school to continue scoring 'very high' to 'excellent' on this measure. We are able to provide students access and support with coursework both in-person and virtually, design learning plans and course-loads that work with students' current life commitments and schedule, provide quiet spaces to be productive in, ensure students have the technology and resources required to succeed, share timely feedback on course submissions that students can use to upgrade assignments, and bring community organizations and experts into our building to network and present to students on various social issues like bullying, addictions, anger/violence, financial wellness and more. Our staff is also collaborating with Roland Michener Secondary School on developing a more effective Knowledge & Employability (K&E) program for high school students in the Slave Lake area. All staff members associated with our school are expected to attend School Support Team Meetings monthly to build capacity in dealing with at-risk students, by identifying perceived issues or obstacles our students are facing and committing to action items to address these challenges. Despite the success, we hope to see growth on this measure in 2025 after the addition of an educational assistant to Lakeside Outreach School for the first time this year, who will be directed to target at-risk students with tutoring and academic support daily.

COMMENTS

Lakeside Outreach School has been hovering between 22%-26% for three years on the 'Rutherford Eligibility Rate.' This data is affected by a number of things, including transient families with multiple school enrolments throughout a high school career often finding their home in outreach schools, and the fact we sometimes are a means of intervention for students with severe attendance problems or expulsions from other High Prairie School Division schools where they are already not seeing academic success. Addictions and wellness can be a primary concern for some members of our small student population as well, distracting from a focus on academic success. With that being said, efforts will be placed on growth in this measure for 2025 through a clear communication campaign about this scholarship, and the ability to use teacher feedback to upgrade assignments in pursuit of this incentive. Some students require extra encouragement to go beyond the bare minimum required for a high-school diploma, including those who are being tempted away from school by the oil, gas and lumber opportunities that already exist for them in their local area. In addition, we are exploring ways to increase credit options for students at our school, improving the potential for students in meeting this criteria through our programming. Our school's new educational assistant is being utilized to support earlier success for students in Social Studies and English Language Arts as a new way we are pursuing growth in this measure as well. Lastly, our administration team continues to advocate for an additional teacher with at least a half time focus on these humanities courses at our school, which we believe could have a significant impact on this measure, and lead to an increase in our student population.

COMMENTS

The trend in this data, despite our maintenance of 'excellent,' is that as the student population increases and more of them complete the survey, performance on the measure gradually decreases to be more in line with the school authority and province. While we are in a better place with this measure than four years ago, there are steps we are taking to maintain or improve it for 2025. As the number of students attending campus increases, due to an increase in full time enrolments, staff members need to be vigilant in ensuring they all have a healthy connection to someone in our building when present. During the past four years we have also seen an increase in students working online and off-site. Advertising in-person only events (credit opportunities, open houses, guest speakers, field trips etc.) on social media, via the monthly school newsletter, and through recruitment campaigns is one way we try to maintain connections and bring students into the building to experience a safe and caring environment, that continues to be available to support them. Additionally staff members are being encouraged to place increased importance on communicating with our at-home learners and families via phone, email and Google Classroom. Safe virtual options are available for our students and families to acquire academic support and tutoring services, attend parent-teacher interviews and connect with the other wrap-around services we offer.

COMMENTS

Lakeside Outreach School works closely with Roland Michener Secondary School to maintain a strong partnership that allows us to better address the learning needs of high school students within Slave Lake and the surrounding communities. The schools are sometimes able to partner up on shared learning experiences to make them more accessible to students and teachers. We also collaborate on effective delivery of tier 3 support to our most at-risk students. Lakeside Outreach School students are also able to participate in graduation, student leadership and athletic opportunities that exist at Roland Michener Secondary School. In addition, students are introduced to various community venues and services throughout the year through our athletics program, Jr. PD Day initiative and CALM Blitz event. A student handbook was published during the 2023-2024 school year highlighting our connection to some community programs and included a 'Helpline and Community Resources' page, and a school wellness coach was available to meet one-on-one with students, and refer students and families to community resources as needed.

COMMENTS

We are always looking to improve our school and celebrate divisional achievements with our learning community. That is why it is encouraging to see Lakeside Outreach School continue to significantly outperform the province and school authority with respect to students believing their school or schools in their jurisdiction have improved or stayed the same the last three years. In addition to improving our asynchronous courses students are working through, during the 2023-2024 school year we revamped the school nutrition program to more intentionally generate high school credits and feed students daily, introduced a 'living wall' to our learning environment, published school celebrations in a monthly newsletter and on social media, and worked with High Prairie School Division's maintenance, technology and safety departments to ensure the facility is safe, connected and fully accessible to support all students.

COMMENTS

Data collected from HPSD surveys highlights that students in our area often explore different avenues after high school, including apprenticeships, immediate workforce entry, academic upgrading, gap years, or staying home to support families. These are the circumstances we are up against when considering this measure, with our current concern being that we are performing significantly lower than the school authority. As a priority, we will continue to provide personalized and wraparound support to help improve transition rates. Our career coach works closely with students interested in post-secondary education and champions dual-credit opportunities, trades exploration and campus tours for those enrolled in our school. Last year we nominated a student to take part in the Verna J. Kirkness Foundation (VJFK) program, who was accepted and spent time at the University of Victoria. We are seeing some growth in our performance on this measure.
